The anatomy and physiology of oral and pharyngeal phases will be reviewed using evidence from a scoping review describing common problems for both phases. Specific evidence-based interventions will be discussed and applied using case illustrations.

About Our Presenters



Cesar Arada, OTD,

OTR/L, is a San Jose State University academic fieldwork coordinator and lecturer. He earned a postprofessional clinical doctorate in occupational therapy from the University of Alabama Birmingham with a graduate certification in

low vision, an MHS in health care services from Washington University in St. Louis, Missouri, and a Bachelor of Science in occupational therapy from the University of the Philippines. Arada is licensed as an occupational therapist in California with certifications in physical agent modalities and swallowing. He has over 32 years of clinical experience working with the geriatric population, holding senior management positions. Arada currently serves on the OTAC Board of Directors as the Region 3 Director.



Jerilyn (Gigi) Smith, PhD, OTR/L, FAOTA,

has been an occupational therapy practitioner for 40 years. She received a bachelor's and postprofessional master's in occupational therapy from San Jose State University

and earned a PhD in health sciences from Touro University International. Smith is an associate professor and chair of the Occupational Therapy Department at San Jose State University where she also acts as a faculty advisor for student research projects. She is also the graduate admissions coordinator and advisor for the Occupational Therapy Program. Smith sits on multiple committees at the university, college, and departmental levels. She has written several chapters in well-respected occupational therapy textbooks, and has lectured locally, nationally, and internationally on various topics, but most extensively on occupational therapy's role in dysphagia intervention. Her clinical experience includes working with adults with neurological disorders in a variety of practice settings and with children 0-3 years old in early intervention home care. Smith has been an active member of both AOTA and OTAC since the time she was a student, serving on many different committees and in various leadership roles. She currently serves as cochair of the OTAC Practice, Ethics, and Reimbursement Committee. In 2021, Smith received the OTAC Lifetime Achievement Award.



Graham Teaford, OTD, OTR/L, is an assistant professor of occupational therapy at San Jose State University (SJSU). He is an occupational therapy practitioner with clinical experience working with older adults in community settings. Teaford

completed the Low Vision Rehabilitation Graduate Certificate Program at the University of Alabama Birmingham (UAB) in 2018 and doctorate in occupational therapy from UAB in 2022. He completed an executive certificate in home modification program from USC in 2016, and in the AOTA specialty certification in low vision (SCLV) in 2020. He has been a faculty member at SJSU since 2008, and has taught courses in neurorehabilitation, occupational therapy with older adults, clinical practice in occupational therapy, fieldwork practicum and seminar, and infusing occupation in clinical practice. Teaford's research interests include neurological assessment and intervention, fall prevention for older adults, community aging, home modification, low vision rehabilitation, ethics, and community based occupational therapy programs.
