Dear Occupational Therapy Practitioners, Educators, Students, Colleagues,



5 Handle with Care®: Behavior Management System (7 PDUs)

Verbal Method: Handle with Care* (HWC) training is an empowerment program for teachers, staff, consumers, and students. We teach staff how to be a solid object. HWC's training describes how when a person or student is spiraling out of control and cannot contain his or her emotions, conflict, or tension, the practitioner can step in and offer assistance.

Physical Method: How to manage situations where the only appropriate and least restrictive response is the prompt skillful use of physical intervention. You hold someone to protect them and others from the physical and emotional consequences of out-of-control behavior.
