What is the primary purpose of the California Board of Occupational Therapy? Do you know when your OT/OTA license expires? How is occupational therapy defined in our Practice Act? Who may be granted a limited permit? Are you aware of the proposed amendments to the text for the Ethical Standards of Practice? In light of healthcare reform, advancements in technology, and societal priorities and needs, California is experiencing rapid change in the delivery of healthcare services that include increased focus on prevention, wellness, primary care, behavioral health, and habilitation; the expansion and movement toward population-based approaches; comprehensive, coordinated care and follow-up by teams; and occupation-based/functional outcomes. This also means changes in requirements for and how documentation and reimbursement are managed. For occupational therapy practitioners, this is a dynamic, complex, and paradigm-changing time that offers huge opportunities. However, we also have to be proactive and prepared to meet the challenges, and ensure that regulatory and legislative requirements and policies balance protection of the consumer and reasonable regulatory guidance for occupational therapy practice.

This panel will provide an overview of these issues, including an update on the status of proposed regulations and review of Board actions, OTAC activities related to regulatory and legislative issues, and the importance of practitioners being aware of current trends and regulations/legislation, and being actively involved in protecting our scope of practice and promoting occupational therapy's role in the changing landscape of healthcare in California.
