Did you know that there are proposed regulations addressing ethical standards of practice and standards of practice for telehealth? Or that a proposed amendment to the definition of occupational therapy may be introduced? Are you familiar with the disciplinary guidelines utilized by the California Board of Occupational Therapy? What are the implications if the profession moves to doctoral entry-level? Do you know what licensure portability is? As healthcare reform, technology, and societal priorities and needs bring shifts in focus to prevention, wellness, primary care, behavioral health, and habilitation, the delivery of healthcare services is expanding and moving toward population-based approaches; comprehensive, coordinated care and follow-up by teams; and occupation-based/functional outcomes. This also means requirements for and how documentation and reimbursement are managed must reflect and adapt to these changes. What does this mean for occupational therapy

and our scope of practice in California? This is a dynamic, complex, and paradigm-changing time that offers immense opportunities for OT practitioners, but we must be proactive and prepared to meet the challenges, and ensure that regulatory and legislative requirements and policies balance protection of the consumer and reasonable regulatory guidance for occupational therapy practice. This panel will provide an overview of these issues, including an update on the status of proposed regulations and review of CBOT Board actions, OTAC activities related to regulatory issues, and the importance of practitioners being aware of current trends and regulations/legislation and being actively involved in protecting our scope of practice and promoting OT's role in the changing landscape of healthcare in California.
