About Our Presenters



Tina Champagne, OTD, OTR/L (MA), FAOTA, is the CEO of Cutchins Programs for Children and Families, Inc., owner of Champagne Conferences & Consultation, and a professor for American International College's Post Professional

Occupational Therapy Doctorate Program. She has specific expertise in trauma, attachment, sensory integration, a variety of therapeutic modalities, administration, and fostering organizational change. Champagne has numerous publications, including two books, numerous book chapters, continuing education and research articles, and is a reviewer for occupational therapy and nursing journals. She has received numerous awards for her work, the most recent being the FAOTA from the American Occupational Therapy Association.



Will Hall, survivor of a schizophrenia diagnosis, now works as a therapist, trainer, and is a PhD Candidate at Maastricht University in the Netherlands. He is host of Madness Radio and

author of the Harm Reduction Guide to Coming off Psychiatric Drugs.



Adrian Bernard was labeled a 'chronic schizophrenic" and spent 20 years living on a disability check. Today he is manager at the Second Story hospital alternative in Santa Cruz, CA, where listening, community, art, and music help people like him make their way back from madness.

Bernard has experienced the full gambit of the mental health system. From difficulty adapting during his formative years to self-destruction ideologies, until finally he was able to rise unto his own feet. Through visions, voices, and madness, creativity emerged. Music, various arts, and writing opened him to the people, places, and things that everyone most needs to be able to open. He would not have made it without the help and support of providers, family, and friends. A deep listener for a lifetime, Bernard has been touched by every spiritual tradition to find transformation. His work as manager of Second Story returns meaning to his life. He is able to support others on their journey through varying states of madness, including his own. A peer respite house is built upon personal experiences in the hopes to find mutual understanding about how and why we are in the world, while building the strength to climb out of perceptual self-destruction. Bernard was one of the founders of Santa Cruz's respite house over eight years ago. His work is not so much a career as it is the deepest of his callings to find healing. Bernard most always finds it odd to write in the third person.

About his session -- A Mystical Journey Revealed. How can a new understanding of psychotic and manic experiences help people find connection and empowerment in the community, and move away from reliance on hospitals, disability payments, and treatments?
